9. EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORT. Dr. Stephen Robertson gave the following report.

**Kentucky Dental Association
Executive Director Report, Dr. Stephen W Robertson
May 30,2026**

The KDA has just completed what must be the most successful legislative session we have enjoyed, possibly ever. This was due to the culmination of efforts from many of our members over the past 3 years, spearheaded by our contract lobbyist, Libby Miligan, of McCarthy Strategic Solutions. We are truly lucky to be able to retain such a respected group that has truly “bought in” on our goals and message.

Through the support of numerous legislators in both the House and Senate, we were able to usher through sweeping changes to the Kentucky Dental Medicaid program. The Medicaid carve-out is scheduled for January 1, 2029, and we also were able to secure the first ever direct appropriation for reimbursement enhancement in the history of the program. Just as importantly, the legislature assigned a vital role in both processes to the Dental Technical Advisory Committee, ensuring provider input in the program moving forward. The law also dictates

This process is just the beginning; we have completed the first step. The increase received will hopefully be enough to allow those currently accepting Medicaid to be able to continue in the program, however, numerous challenges still exist. We need to show that we can grow and nurture this program and continue our push for increased funding heading into the Carve-out. The 20% increase is not enough to allow for a direct across the board increase of fees, so the TAC is committed to directing the funds to where they will allow the biggest effect on the program and utilization. They will also be tasked with establishing the guardrails and guidelines for the ASO to be hired to function within the Carve-out.

The TAC has been able to strike a renewed partnership with the Medicaid Department that will hopefully lead to positive changes for all; patients and providers. Our TAC is to be commended for the dedication and efforts, as they have certainly risen to the task.

Additionally, we were able to keep many bills detrimental to oral health and the practice of dentistry from passing. Notably, the anti-fluoridation bill and intrusions from other licensing entities into dental offices. We were able to make positive changes within a proposed school nurse bill, that ultimately was not heard in the Senate but will hopefully come back next year.

The KDA helped shepherd the updated Dental Practice Act bill from the Board of Dentistry to passage, and I will allow Mr. Jeff Allen to fill the Board in on the contents of this new law. I will add that it was accepted as an emergency action, so it went into effect immediately upon passage. One notable component was a section greatly restricting the ability of an entity that sets reimbursement rates to own dental practices (i.e.; insurers,) and guarantees clinical autonomy for all dentists regardless of practice ownership.

We were able to pass our Non-Covered Services clean-up bill by attaching it as an amendment to the Dental Practice Act. This bill was constructed in cooperation with the Department of Insurance to mitigate as many issues as possible. The effective date of the bill is July 15, 2026. After that date, and the renewal of the provider contract held with the individual insurers, over the maximum is a non-covered service by law. This renewal date could be a random anniversary date, January 1, or the fiscal date of July 1. All must ask renewal dates to know the effective date for each plan.

The Assignment of Benefits law passed in 2025 is active and the regulations have been accepted. Use of the form is optional and only necessary if it is desired that payment be delivered to the office rather than the patient. Also, the joint Well-Being program between the KDA and the Board of Dentistry is live and functioning! I will allow Jeff Allen and Dr Kate Von Lakum to address this in greater detail.

The 2026 Kentucky Meeting is planned and the Journal with all the registration information will be in your mailbox soon. We are switching to a new electronic registration system, and all CE will be delivered through this entity. Todd Edwards has worked tirelessly to get this application up and running and deserves your thanks and appreciation. All information with the registration links will be posted on the website soon.

On Thursday, May 21, after the Journal was already off to the printer, we received notice that Colgate, the Governor's Office, and the ADA will be holding a joint event at the Kentucky meeting on Thursday afternoon August 20. This will necessitate the cancellation of the scheduled Executive Board meeting for that day. This event is still in the preliminary planning stages, and more information will be shared with all as it becomes available. We have been told the Governor himself selected our meeting at the site for this oral health focused event.

I had the opportunity to meet with the representatives from the Rural Transformation Grant program at the KDA office on Thursday, May 28. This process is moving quickly and a more specific update will be provided verbally as they are envisioning extensive KDA involvement moving forward. The focus of the Board will need to be on identification and recruitment of members willing to represent and participate in the work group process. Their identified area of focus are Dental Hygiene Training, Public Health Dental Hygienist utilization, mobile dental units, continuing education, Dental Assistant training, advanced surgical extraction training for general dentists, and Teledentistry hubbed through the Universities. There are potential avenues for direct KDS utilization of funds we will discuss.

Lastly, in your information there was a flyer related to the Operation AED program, requesting KDA support. Similarly, we need to reach an agreement on a reciprocal non-dues revenue program that the committee can present to interested entities.

Our agenda remains full! Together We Thrive!

10. SIXTH DISTRICT TRUSTEE REPORT. Dr Fred Howard gave a verbal report.

11. KENTUCKY BOARD OF DENTISTRY. Dr Kate von Lackum gave a verbal report on behalf Mr. Jeff Allen and provided the written comments below.

Analysis of House Bill 776

The following report describes the contents and location of the changes to KRS 313 contained within HB776, which was signed into law on April 13, 2026. The bill can be viewed in its final form here.

Section 1(6) changes the definition of “dental hygienist” to mean anyone with an active Kentucky dental hygiene license. This change is merely meant to simplify the definition and indicate who is specifically being referred to when the Practice Act or its associated regulations use that title. This definition does not—and has never been—intended to define the parameters of dental hygiene licensure. Those requirements are thoroughly established elsewhere, specifically, 201 KAR 8:563. As such, removing the reference to the Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) in this definition does not, by itself, eliminate CODA requirements for licensure. The Board has submitted a proposed revision to 201 KAR 8.533 that provides internationally trained dentists with a pathway to become licensed dental hygienists. In this instance, a foreign dental school degree can be accepted in place of a CODA-accredited dental hygiene degree. Otherwise, the existing CODA requirements for hygiene licensure will not change.

Section 1(9) simplifies the definition of “dental specialist” to mean anyone with a Kentucky dental specialty license. Removing the reference to ADA-recognized specialties here does not change the requirements for specialty licensure, as those are provided for in KRS 313.035 as well as Section 8 of 201 KAR 8.533.

Section 1(10) changes the definition of “dentist” to simply mean anyone with an active Kentucky dentist license. Again, this change is intended to streamline the definition and create uniformity with other, similar definitions within KRS 313. Just like with “dental hygienist” or “dental specialist” above, the statutory definition of “dentist” is not intended to address license eligibility. As per Sections 1 and 4 of 201 KAR 8.533, a CODA-accredited dental degree or postgraduate program is still—and will continue to be—required for licensure. The Board has submitted a proposed revision to 201 KAR 8.533 that will allow internationally trained dentists to be licensed as dental specialists. However, this still requires the completion of a CODA-accredited specialty program, just like what is already in place for foreign dentists who complete a general dentistry program.

Section 1(11) revises the definition of “dentistry” but in style, not substance. These are housekeeping changes designed to conform KRS 313 to current practices in organizing statutory language.

Section 2(1) makes several revisions to the makeup of the Board, including requiring at least three of the voting dentists on the Board to be general dentists. This is intended to make the Board more representative of the state’s dentist population. It also removes reference to specific dental schools and simply provides for an ex officio board seat to all CODA-accredited dental schools in Kentucky. The purpose of this language is to establish a seat for the new Tanner College of Dental Medicine at the University of Pikeville. In anticipation of Kentucky adding at least one new dental hygiene degree program, a second ex officio board seat was created to more appropriately represent the hygiene programs. In addition, each program will have a two-year term in the rotation, instead of the previous one year. **Section 3(1)(i)** provides for the Board to affiliate with testing organizations that administer qualifying licensure examinations. This is simply intended to formalize the Board’s commitment to licensure examinations and codify what is already current practice. **Section 3(4)** requires the Board to purchase liability insurance. Maintaining a liability policy is common practice among professional licensing boards.

Section 4(4) allows the Board to establish a student loan repayment assistance fund to address dental workforce shortage areas. This is only authorizing language, and does not, on its own, establish the fund. The Board still needs to formally create the fund and define its rules, which it will do through the administrative regulation process.

Section 5(11) removes obsolete language that no longer applies.

Section 6(3) removes the reference to the American Dental Association recognizing dental specialties and replaces it with the more specific and accurate National Commission on the Recognition of Dental Specialties

and Certifying Boards. It also allows qualified dental specialists to practice outside of their specialty for limited purposes when referred by a general dentist.

Section 7(7)(a)1 eliminates the redundant two years of experience prerequisite for registration in general supervision but keeps the 3,000 work hours requirement. **Section 7(7)(a)4** extends the time since the patient's last examination that a dental hygienist can practice under general supervision from seven months to eleven months.

Section 7(9) allows dental hygienists to make radiographs with a written order if the dentist is not physically present.

Section 8(7)(a) eliminates the removal of calcareous deposits or accretions on the crowns and roots of teeth from the list of duties prohibited by dental assistants. However, the scope of practice for dental hygienists and assistants is also addressed in other parts of KRS 313 and its associated regulations. The removal of this language alone does not allow dental assistants to perform scaling.

Section 8(7)(c) allows dental assistants to make final impressions.

Section 8(6) allows qualifying dental assistants to use a dental hygiene cordless polisher.

Sections 8(8) and 9(2) clarify that the Board-approved training in radiography technique and safety does not have to be through a formal course.

Section 12(1)(a)–(c) was taken from existing language in Section 13(1)(a)–(c) to start a new section.

Section 12(2) clarifies that clinical decisions affecting patient care remain with the dentist and that no other person or entity may exercise control over such decisions.

Section 12(3) prevents any person or entity that establishes reimbursement rates for dental services from directly or indirectly controlling the clinical operations of a dental practice.

Section 12(4) is a grandfather clause that exempts pre-existing arrangements from the provisions of this section.

Section 13(1)(a)–(c) was moved to become Section 12(1)(a)–(c).

Section 13(2)(c) establishes that a violation of “moral or ethical standards” is sufficient grounds for disciplinary action.

Section 14(10) clarifies that the Law Enforcement Committee can offer settlement agreements as part of its disciplinary authority.

Section 15(4) allows the Board to enter into contractual agreements with any entity to administer or support the Well-being Committee, not just nonprofit organizations.

Section 15(8) clarifies that the confidentiality of Well-being Committee records does not extend to formal disciplinary actions issued by the Law Enforcement Committee or the Board.

Section 16(1) clarifies that the Board's regulatory authority over dental laboratories includes any lab that is either “operating or doing business” in Kentucky.

Section 17 formally names KRS 313 as the Kentucky Dental Practice Act.

Sections 18–19 were part of a floor amendment on limited health services benefits plans that was added to HB776 at the last minute. It is unrelated to the rest of the bill and does not amend KRS 313. **Section 20** is an emergency clause, meaning that the bill takes effect immediately once it is signed by the Governor, rather than the standard 90 days after the end of the legislative session. _____

College Updates

- The UKCD Class of 2026 performed exceptionally well on the ADEX Clinical Board Examination this year. The overall first-time pass rate was 96%, with individual section results of 90% in Restorative, 92% in Endodontics, and 100% in Prosthodontics.
- The Division of Dental Public Health's SEAL KY program is celebrating a major milestone with the completion of its first year providing restorative care through its mobile dental clinic in Greenup County. Building on its foundation of preventive services, the addition of restorative treatment has expanded access to care and improved oral health outcomes for students in this rural community.

UofL Breaks Ground on \$280-Million Facility for Health Education and Collaboration

On April 21, 2026, the University of Louisville formally broke ground today on a transformative new building that will serve as a cornerstone for education, engagement, and research at the UofL Health Sciences Center and as a resource for the broader university and health care communities.

The new Health Sciences Building, located along Preston Street from Chestnut to Gray, will be a connecting point for the UofL Schools of Dentistry, Medicine, Nursing, and Public Health and Information Sciences. The six-story, 257,000-square-foot structure will enable UofL to increase enrollment in health professions programs to meet existing and future health care workforce demands.

The structure is infused with an emphasis on collaboration, engagement, and wellbeing for those who use each space. Extensive simulation facilities will incorporate the latest technology where health professions students, residents, and clinical professionals can gain practical skills training.

With an estimated cost of \$280 million, the building represents the largest single-project funding package in UofL's history. The State of Kentucky has allocated \$260 million toward the project, with the university providing the remaining \$20 million.

The building design is a product of architects Champlin | EOP with Perkins&Will, and Messer construction is the general contractor. Construction is expected to be completed in 2029.

May 30, 2026**

College Updates:

- The University of Pikeville Tanner College of Dental Medicine continues steady institutional advancement as a core academic, clinical, and workforce development initiative for Eastern Kentucky and Central Appalachia, with ongoing progress in construction, recruitment, and program implementation.
- Facilities development remains on schedule, with Phase I completion (June 16, 2027) and Phase II completion (February 14, 2028), supported by interim instructional infrastructure including a 54-station Pre-Clinical Simulation Laboratory.
- The TCDM will utilize interim locations to support delivery of the first-year curriculum while permanent facilities are completed. The expansive project to construct a **Preclinical Simulation Clinic** at 129 Caroline Avenue was carried out under the direction of the UPIKE construction team, resulting in the establishment of a state-of-the-art center equipped with 54 A-dec student workstations, a faculty workstation, two SIMtoCARE haptic units, an anatomy laboratory, a digital laboratory, a support laboratory, student lounge, locker rooms, dispensary, and mechanical room. These spaces ensure a comprehensive, technology-enhanced learning environment aligned with the University's commitment to excellence in dental education. An Open House for the Board of Trustees was completed on May 1, 2026.
- An alternate location for **Clinical Instruction** has been identified at the East Kentucky Oral Health Training Center in Paintsville. This 20-operatory space is owned by Big Sandy Community and Technical College, and a lease agreement has been signed to utilize the space during the 2026-2027 academic year.

Faculty and Staff Updates:

Faculty recruitment has strengthened academic capacity with new leadership across clinical, biomedical, and administrative domains, enhancing program delivery and institutional growth. The following faculty members have joined the Tanner College of Dental Medicine

- **Dr. Ben Bartlett (Assistant Professor of Oral and Maxillofacial Radiology):**
Dr. Bartlett is a trained Oral and Maxillofacial Radiologist who completed a rigorous three-year residency program at UT Health San Antonio, where he also earned a Master of Science degree and served as Chief Resident during his final year. He earned his Doctor of Dental Surgery (D.D.S.) from the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio, where he received the Junior Clinic Award for Excellence in Clinical Dentistry, and holds a Bachelor of Science in Biology from the University of Texas. Prior to his academic appointment, he practiced as an associate dentist in Texas, gaining experience in comprehensive patient care, diagnostic imaging, and restorative procedures. His combined background in clinical dentistry, advanced radiologic training, and education positions him to contribute meaningfully to both student learning and patient care in an academic environment.
- **Dr. Emily Bowen (Associate Professor of Dental Public Health):**
Dr. Emily Bowen is a dental educator and public health leader who joined the University of Pikeville Tanner College of Dental Medicine in May 2026. She earned her Doctor of Dental Surgery from

Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, a Master of Public Health from East Tennessee State University, and a Master of Arts in Higher, Adult, and Lifelong Education from Michigan State University. Dr. Bowen has contributed to research and statewide initiatives focused on oral health equity, workforce development, and public health, and has been selected for competitive leadership programs, including the National Rural Health Association Rural Health Fellowship and the Dental Public Health Leadership Academy. Her work reflects a strong commitment to expanding access to care and strengthening the healthcare workforce in underserved communities.

- **Dr. Sheila Brear (Associate Dean of Academic Affairs):**

Dr. Brear is a distinguished dental educator and academic leader with more than 35 years of experience in curriculum development, accreditation, and educational innovation. Recognized through national awards and international presentations, she is also an experienced healthcare writer and policy reviewer who has contributed to the development and evaluation of scientific documents and institutional policies across multiple healthcare and academic organizations.

- **Dr. Anita Hale (Adjunct Clinical Faculty)**

Dr. Anita Hale joined the University of Pikeville Tanner College of Dental Medicine as an Adjunct Clinical Faculty Member, where she provides comprehensive dental care at the Pike County Health Department. In this role, she is dedicated to serving children who rely on Medicaid or who lack private insurance, addressing a critical need within the region and advancing access to care for underserved populations. Dr. Hale earned her undergraduate degree from Transylvania University and her Doctor of Dental Medicine (DMD) from the University of Louisville School of Dentistry. Prior to her academic appointment, she owned and operated a private dental practice in Floyd County, Kentucky, for more than four decades. Her extensive clinical experience and deep commitment to community-based care bring invaluable perspective and expertise to the Tanner College of Dental Medicine and its mission to improve oral health across Central Appalachia.

- **Dr. Karen Pruett (Director of Student Affairs of Academic Excellence):**

Dr. Karen Pruett is an accomplished higher education administrator and student affairs leader with more than two decades of experience across multiple institutions. She previously served as the Vice President for Student Development at Young Harris College, where she oversaw a comprehensive portfolio including counseling services, career and professional development, housing and residence life, student

conduct, disability services, and campus safety. Dr. Pruett holds a Doctor of Philosophy in Higher Education Administration and a Master of Education in Community Agency Counseling from Auburn University, as well as a Bachelor of Science in Psychology from Berry College. Her career reflects a sustained commitment to fostering student development, advancing institutional effectiveness, and supporting holistic student success within higher education.

- **Dr. Vickie Jones (Professor of Dental Hygiene):**

The University of Pikeville was pleased to welcome Dr. Vickie Jones, who joined the Tanner College of Dental Medicine in March 2026. This accomplished dental educator holds a Doctor of Health Science (DHSc) from Pacific University (2024), a Master of Science in Dental Hygiene from the University of Tennessee Health Science Center (highest honors), a Bachelor of Science in Dental Hygiene from the University of Tennessee–Memphis (highest honors), and an Associate of Applied Science from Northeast Mississippi Community College. Dr. Brian Novy, an internationally recognized expert in the field of cariology, has been appointed as an adjunct faculty member at the Tanner College of Dental Medicine, where he will contribute to the first-year curriculum by teaching a foundational course in cariology. In addition to this role, he holds an academic appointment at Harvard School of Dental Medicine. Dr. Novy previously served on the American Dental Association's Council on Scientific Affairs from 2010 to 2014 and, in 2016, was appointed as the consumer representative to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's Dental Products Panel. He has authored numerous publications on cariology and dental materials in leading journals, including the *Journal of the American Dental Association*, *Journal of Dental Research*, and *Journal of Evidence-Based Dental Practice*, among others. His professional honors include the ADA Evidence-Based Practice Award, the ADA Adult Preventive Care Practice of the Year Award, the Dugoni Award, the Academy of General Dentistry Weclaw Award, and recognition as the 2024 Yankee Dental Congress Clinician of the Year. Dr. Novy maintains a clinical practice in Salem, Massachusetts.

- **Dr. Shree Singaravelu (Professor of Pharmacology):**

The University of Pikeville is pleased to welcome Dr. Shree Singaravelu to the Tanner College of Dental Medicine. Dr. Singaravelu is an experienced pharmacologist and medical educator with extensive academic training and international experience. She earned her MBBS from The Tamil Nadu Dr. M.G.R. Medical University (India), followed by an MD in Pharmacology at Annamalai University (India). She subsequently completed a PhD in Pharmacology at Bharath Institute of Higher Education and Research (India), an MPhil in Health Professions Education at Sri Balaji Vidyapeeth (India), and a Master of Medical Education at the University of Dundee (United Kingdom). Dr. Singaravelu has joined the University of Pikeville Tanner College of Dental Medicine following her role as Professor and Chair of Pharmacology at Windsor University School of Medicine (West Indies), where she led curriculum development, assessment, and accreditation efforts while teaching a diverse international student body. Across these roles, she has contributed to curriculum innovation, simulation-based education, pharmacovigilance initiatives, and research mentorship, demonstrating sustained leadership in pharmacology and health professions education.

- **Additional Hiring Updates:**

Many part-time pre-clinical faculty have joined the TCDM bringing a wealth of knowledge to the pre-clinical and clinical settings.

Student Updates:

- Student recruitment efforts for the cohort entering the TCDM in 2026 yielded 1,499 applications for 54 positions. Orientation begins on June 1, 2026, with classes beginning on June 8, 2026.

Research:

- The University of Pikeville Tanner College of Dental Medicine was named the recipient of a \$30,000 grant from the National Association of Dental Plans (NADP). This award supports the pilot project titled “*Bridging the Gap in Central Appalachia: Understanding and Addressing Barriers to Pediatric Dental Care Access Through Innovative Teledentistry Solutions.*” First-year TCDM students will participate in the project beginning in the Fall 2026 semester, with each student contributing fourteen hours of activity as part of their course *DEN 617B Introduction to Public Health and Research*. This integration provides students with practical experience in dental public health research and community engagement. The comprehensive findings from this mixed-methods study will be submitted for publication in the *Journal of Public Health Dentistry*.

Scholarships:

- To date, \$427,000.00 in scholarship funding has been received for the dental students enrolled at the Tanner College of Dental Medicine, from a variety of charitable individuals and philanthropic organizations.

Workgroup Report to the Kentucky Dental Association Board

Recommendation for Comprehensive Evaluation of Professional Service Agreements and Documentation Practices

Purpose of Report

This report is submitted to recommend a comprehensive evaluation of third-party professional services utilized by the Association, including but not limited to landscaping, accounting, legal counsel, and other contracted vendors. The purpose of this evaluation is to strengthen accountability, improve transparency, ensure contractual clarity, and enhance organizational governance through updated agreements and improved documentation standards.

Executive Summary

The workgroup recommends that the Association undertake a formal review of all recurring vendor and professional service relationships to determine whether:

- Current contracts accurately reflect the scope of services being provided;
- Service expectations and deliverables are clearly documented;
- Existing agreements remain current and legally sufficient;
- Billing and invoicing practices align with contractual obligations; and
- Appropriate oversight and performance documentation are maintained.

The workgroup further recommends the implementation of standardized procedures for documenting vendor services, contract renewals, and performance evaluations.

Background

Professional service providers play an essential role in supporting the operations and long-term success of the Association. Over time, however, service arrangements may evolve informally without corresponding updates to written agreements or documentation practices.

Inconsistent documentation or outdated contracts can create:

- Unclear expectations regarding services;
- Potential duplication or gaps in responsibilities;
- Financial inefficiencies;
- Challenges in accountability and oversight; and
- Increased legal and operational risk.

As part of sound governance practices, periodic review of vendor relationships and service agreements is advisable to ensure alignment with the Association's operational and fiduciary responsibilities.

Areas Recommended for Evaluation

The workgroup recommends reviewing all ongoing vendor and professional service arrangements, including:

1. Landscaping and Property Maintenance Services

The current contract/agreement with our landscape provider was executed and signed in 2006. There has been a change in pricing since the execution of that contract, but there is no current documentation on file to reflect those changes.

Evaluation should include:

- Current scope of work;
- Seasonal and recurring maintenance obligations;
- Pricing structures and renewal terms;
- Documentation of completed services; and
- Verification of insurance and licensing requirements.

2. Accounting and Financial Services

The current budget for accounting services is \$20,000 for 2026. In 2025 we spent \$11,440. This appears consistent for the past few years. The invoice/statements received from the CPA do not provide clarity for what level of service we are receiving.

Evaluation should include:

- Scope of accounting, bookkeeping, audit, or consulting services;
- Clarity regarding reporting responsibilities and timelines;
- Internal controls and financial oversight procedures;
- Contract renewal and fee structures; and
- Documentation supporting work performed.

3. Legal Services and Attorney Engagements

In the first quarter of 2026, our engagement with legal counsel resulted in an expenditure that exceeded the adopted, annual budgeted amount by 700%. We have consistently under budgeted for legal fees in the past 3 years.

Evaluation should include:

- Engagement letter terms;
- Billing practices and authorization procedures;
- Defined legal responsibilities and limitations;
- Documentation of services rendered;
- Consideration of real legal costs in budget development; and
- Periodic review of ongoing legal needs and costs.

4. Additional Contracted Services

The same review principles should apply to:

- IT and technology vendors;
- Cleaning and maintenance providers;
- Marketing or communications contractors;
- Human resources consultants; and
- Any recurring professional service arrangements.

Recommendations

The workgroup respectfully recommends the following actions:

A. Conduct a Comprehensive Contract Review

The Association should inventory all current vendor and professional service agreements and determine:

- Whether written contracts exist;
- Whether agreements are current and signed;
- Whether terms remain appropriate for present operational needs; and
- Whether measurable deliverables are adequately defined.

B. Update and Standardize Service Agreements

Where appropriate, contracts should be revised to include:

- Clear scopes of work;
- Defined deliverables and timelines;
- Fee schedules and billing expectations;
- Renewal and termination provisions;
- Insurance and compliance requirements; and
- Documentation and reporting expectations.

C. Improve Documentation Standards

The Association should establish standardized procedures for documenting:

- Services provided;
- Dates of service completion;
- Vendor communications;
- Approval processes;
- Contract amendments; and
- Periodic performance evaluations.

D. Establish Periodic Review Procedures

The workgroup recommends scheduled reviews of all recurring service relationships on an annual or biennial basis to ensure continued effectiveness, competitiveness, and accountability.

Benefits of Implementation

Implementation of these recommendations may provide several organizational benefits, including:

- Increased transparency and accountability;
- Improved financial oversight;
- Better continuity of operations;
- Reduced legal and operational risk;
- More efficient vendor management; and
- Stronger governance practices consistent with nonprofit and professional association standards.

Conclusion

The workgroup believes that a structured evaluation of professional services and associated documentation practices would strengthen the operational integrity and governance framework of the Association. Updated contracts, clearly defined expectations, and improved documentation procedures will support responsible stewardship of Association resources and promote long-term organizational effectiveness.

Minutes from Governance Work Group (Amended 5/4/2026)

Date: April 20th, 2026, 7:00 pm

Meeting was called to order by Dr. Ansley Depp. In attendance were Governance Work Group members, Ansley Depp, Darren Greenwell, and Jonathon Rich. Ex-officio members present were, Sam Shaver, Rachel Gold, Kate Von Lackum, Fred Howard and ED Steve Robertson.

Background was given by Dr. Depp regarding the purpose behind the General Assembly (here after referred to as GA); Election of Officers, Receives the President's report, hosts our Randall Marcus reception AND open to all KDA members. The KDA General Assembly has become mostly symbolic and not useful with very low attendance.

Background was given by Dr. Depp regarding the purpose of the House of Delegates (here after referred to as HOD); All other official reports given, all legislative processes for the KDA, and open to KDA delegates only. Dr. Greenwell gave his reasoning for bringing the resolution to the floor to dissolve the HOD.

1. We must coerce members to attend
2. The same people speak up and debate on the floor each year
3. The expense of the rooms for two days and microphones
4. Delegates must miss CE to attend
5. Delegates have to show up for two days.
6. The delegates we have need better education to be a functioning HOD

Dr. Depp mentioned our difficulty in meeting quorum and suggested that at the very least a resolution to address quorum needed to come out of this meeting.

Dr. Howard mentioned that the ADA is 25% of delegates and 25% of constituents represented. He also mentioned that the KDA is one of the only states, if not the only one that allows all members to elect officers. There was some discussion regarding other forms of governance including; Executive board with full decision making power, town halls, no HOD at all, and CA governance of a heavy-handed Executive Board with a minimal functioning HOD that has created a fragmented CDA.

We discussed the virtues of election of the officers taking place in HOD rather than GA. Members agreed on this.

We discussed electronic voting already in our bylaws. However, at this point, we elect officers in our GA, and that needs to be addressed.

Dr. Depp then brought forth to the group the discussion she and Steve had with New Mexico ED. Their HOD flows as follows:

1. 1st session of HOD –Virtual. At least 1 week before their annual meeting. During their 1st HOD they have most reports, most presentations, election of officers. This is all done virtually. Elections are announced here unless there is multiple running for one office. Then they may move that election to the live HOD.
2. Reference committee meets virtually between the 1st Virtual HOD and their annual meeting. Discussion is had, comments made. From that the staff, reference committee and speaker draft the resolutions to be brought to the floor of the HOD
3. New Mexico hold virtual caucuses of their societies. (We do not have that)
4. 2nd HOD is held live at the annual meeting. 9-12:00 pm. This is when the President of the ADA speaks and all resolutions are brought forward. The delegates vote on resolutions. Live elections are held if needed. All officers inducted at this HOD.

A SHAREPOINT site is used for all documents. This way the reference committee can see the changes as they happen. Makes communicating virtually much easier.

Dr. Howard mentioned that Missouri in our district does their HOD very similarly.

A short discussion was had on a “Virtual Town Hall” that would happen in April that would substitute for the GA for all members.

Dr. Depp brought forth testimony from delegate Neil Rush included in agenda.

All discussion was positive towards moving forward with a HOD concept similar to New Mexico.

Submitted Testimony: Delegate Neil Rush:

I think that keeping the House of Delegates at the annual KDA meeting ensures that their most important decisions are made in full view of the membership, with maximum participation, accountability, and alignment with current clinical and economic realities.

The annual meeting is the one time when the broadest cross-section of dentists is present—general dentists, specialists, new graduates, and the KDA leadership.

Delegates are informed by conversations with constituents

Issues discussed reflect current concerns

The meeting reduces the risk of decisions being perceived as made by a small group of insiders.

Holding the House during the annual meeting reinforces open governance.

- Members can observe, question, and understand decisions
- Builds trust in leadership, when membership is declining
- Avoids perception of “closed-door” decision-making

Combining governance with the annual meeting:

- Reduces travel burden and cost for delegates
- Increases likelihood of full delegate attendance
- Allows for more debate due to broader input

Younger dentists and emerging leaders attend the annual meeting far more than they would at standalone sessions.

- Exposure to the House will encourage future leadership
- Also encourages mentorship and continuity

The House of Delegates is the voice of Dentistry within the state.

- Holding it at the central gathering reinforces its importance
- Sends a message that governance is not separate from membership—it is owned by it
- We usually have a legislator recognized during the House

Maintaining the House of Delegates at the annual meeting is not about preserving a format—it is about ensuring that decisions are made where the profession is most present, informed, and engaged.

Action items:

- Dr. Depp and Dr. Robertson will talk to Missouri’s ED to see how they structure theirs and will reach out to New Mexico to see by-laws.
- Change quorum for HOD to 25% of delegates and at least 50% of components represented
- Change membership committee from 5 up to 11 members

Add option of Virtual Town Hall with format given to Executive Board to decide.

- Adding Tanner College of Dentistry to our bylaws in multiple areas
- Pursue bylaw changes to eliminate GA, move voting for officers to the delegates and add bylaw changes to allow for a virtual HOD and reference committee.

The date of May 11, Monday at 7:00 pm was set to reconvene.
Meeting was adjourned by Dr. Depp at 7:47 pm

Report from the 2025 HOD Governance Work Group

The Governance Work Group was established following the 2025 House of Delegates after a motion by Delegate Darren Greenwell to dissolve the House of Delegates was defeated. President Sam Shaver appointed Ansley Depp as Chair, with Delegates Darren Greenwell, Jonathon Rich, and Matt Johnson serving as members of the work group.

The work group met on two occasions, and the minutes from the April 20 and May 11 meetings are included for review.

Following extensive discussion and evaluation, the work group concluded that the duties of the General Assembly could be effectively assimilated into the House of Delegates. This transition would move the election of officers and other ceremonial functions into the House of Delegates while continuing to preserve member participation in KDA governance through the delegate structure.

A significant focus of the discussion centered on the concept of a one-day House of Delegates. After Dr. Robertson and Dr. Depp met with the Executive Director of the New Mexico Dental Association to better understand their governance model, a proposal for a virtual first House of Delegates session and virtual Reference Committee meetings was presented to the Governance Work Group. Under this proposal, the second House of Delegates session would continue to be held during the Kentucky Meeting. This structure would allow greater member participation by reducing the need for delegates to sacrifice two full days of their weekend commitments. Additionally, it would provide delegates the opportunity to participate in Sunday continuing education programs, which historically has not been possible due to House of Delegates obligations.

The removal of the General Assembly requires a constitutional amendment and therefore must receive a unanimous vote for passage in 2026. Should the resolution to dissolve the General Assembly fail this year, it may be reintroduced at the 2027 House of Delegates, where it would require a two-thirds vote for adoption. Please note that any subsequent resolutions transferring General Assembly responsibilities to the House of Delegates would become moot if the constitutional amendment does not pass, though those resolutions could likewise be reconsidered in 2027.

With this background and recommendation, the Governance Work Group respectfully presents the following resolutions to the 2026 House of Delegates.

RESOLUTION 2026-1 (This will require a unanimous vote to pass this year)
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO ELIMINATE THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

ORIGINATOR: Governance Work Group

BACKGROUND: The Kentucky Dental Association has evaluated its current governance structure and determined that consolidating the duties of the General Assembly within the House of Delegates will streamline governance operations, eliminate duplicative processes, and provide continuity in the conduct of Association business. Therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that ARTICLE V, Section 2 of the Constitution be deleted in its entirety, which currently reads: “SECTION 2. GENERAL ASSEMBLY. The General Assembly shall be composed of all members of the Association and shall function as provided in the Bylaws.”

And further resolved, that all references to “General Assembly” throughout the Constitution be replaced with “House of Delegates” where applicable.

RESOLUTION 2026-2 (2/3 after passage of resolution 1)

BYLAWS AMENDMENT TO TRANSFER GENERAL ASSEMBLY DUTIES TO THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES

ORIGINATOR: Governance Work Group

BACKGROUND: The Kentucky Dental Association has determined that the duties currently assigned to the General Assembly can be more efficiently administered through the House of Delegates. This amendment aligns the Bylaws with the proposed constitutional changes and provides continuity in Association operations. Therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that Chapter IV of the Bylaws entitled “General Assembly” be deleted in its entirety.

And further resolved, that all references to “General Assembly” throughout the Bylaws be replaced with “House of Delegates” where applicable.

And further resolved, that the House of Delegates shall assume and perform all duties formerly assigned to the General Assembly, including but not limited to the election of officers and delegates to the American Dental Association, the William Marcus Randall event, and any ceremonial reports.

And further resolved, that all duties formerly listed under Chapter IV shall be incorporated into Chapter III of the Bylaws.

RESOLUTION 2026-3

ORIGINATOR: Governance Work Group

BACKGROUND: Advances in technology and evolving governance practices support the use of virtual and hybrid meetings to improve accessibility, participation, and continuity of Association business. Therefore, be it **RESOLVED**, that Chapter III, Section 5 of the Bylaws be amended to read:

“Meetings of the House of Delegates may be conducted in-person, virtually, or in a format as determined by the Executive Board. Participation by electronic means shall constitute presence for purposes of quorum and voting.”

And further resolved, that Chapter III, Section 12 of the Bylaws be amended to add:

“Reference Committees may conduct meetings and hearings in-person, virtually, or any other format as determined by the Executive Board. Participation by electronic means shall constitute presence.”

RESOLUTION 2026-4

ORIGINATOR: Governance Work Group

BACKGROUND: The Kentucky Dental Association has reviewed the current quorum requirements for the House of Delegates and determined that revising the requirements will allow the Association to conduct business more efficiently while maintaining broad representation among the Component Societies. Therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that Chapter III, Section 7 of the Bylaws be amended to delete the following language:

“Forty percent (40%) of the voting members... representing at least seven (7) component societies”

And further resolved, that the following language be inserted in its place:

“Twenty-five percent (25%) of the voting members of the House of Delegates, representing at least fifty percent (50%) of the Component Societies.”

RESOLUTION 2026- 5

ORIGINATOR: Governance Work Group

BACKGROUND: The Kentucky Dental Association has determined that increasing flexibility in the size of the Membership Committee will better accommodate member participation and allow the committee structure to adapt to the operational needs of the Association. Therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the language in the Bylaws stating:

“The Membership Committee shall consist of five (5) members.”

be amended to read:

“The Membership Committee shall consist of up to eleven (11) members.”

RESOLUTION 2026- 6

ORIGINATOR: Governance Work Group

BACKGROUND: Since the adoption of the current Constitution and Bylaws, the University of Pikeville Tanner College of Dental Medicine has become an accredited dental institution within the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The Kentucky Dental Association recognizes the importance of ensuring that all Kentucky dental schools are appropriately represented throughout the Association’s governing documents. Therefore, be it RESOLVED, that all references within the Constitution and Bylaws to the University of Louisville School of Dentistry and the University of Kentucky College of Dentistry be amended, where applicable, to additionally include the University of Pikeville Tanner College of Dental Medicine.

And further resolved, that any section of the Constitution or Bylaws referencing the dental schools of the Commonwealth of Kentucky shall be interpreted to include the University of Louisville School of Dentistry, the University of Kentucky College of Dentistry, and the University of Pikeville Tanner College of Dental Medicine.

RESOLUTION 2026- 7 (resolution 2026-1 must be voted on first to delete General Assembly. This takes place of chapter IV)

ORIGINATOR: Governance Work Group

BACKGROUND: The Kentucky Dental Association recognizes the importance of encouraging open communication and member engagement in the governance process of the Association. Establishing a Membership Forum prior to the Annual Meeting will provide members with an opportunity to discuss matters affecting the Association and the profession before formal business is conducted by the House of Delegates. Therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that a new Chapter IV entitled “Membership Forum” be added to the Bylaws.

And further resolved, that Chapter IV shall read as follows:

MEMBERSHIP FORUM

SECTION 1. PURPOSE.

The Membership Forum shall serve as an opportunity for the general membership of the Association to discuss matters affecting the Association and the profession.

SECTION 2. FORMAT.

The Membership Forum may be conducted in-person, virtually, or in a format as determined by the Executive Board.

SECTION 3. TIME OF MEETING.

The Executive Board shall determine the date and time of the Membership Forum, provided that the Forum shall be conducted no fewer than four (4) months prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association.

GOVERNMENTAL AFFAIRS. Dr. Darren Greenwell sent in the following report.
Kentucky Dental Association Executive Board Meeting

Date: May 30, 2026

Purpose

Over the past year, the Council on Governmental Affairs met to identify the Kentucky Dental Association's 2026 legislative priorities—those most likely to improve the practice environment for Kentucky dentists.

Key Topics Discussed

- Dental Loss Ratio (DLR)
- Medicaid reimbursement
- Clarifying language related to non-covered services
- Oral Preventive Assistant (OPA)
- Corporate ownership of dental practices

Decisions and Next Steps

- **DLR:** Executive leadership chose not to pursue DLR legislation this session.
- **OPA and corporate ownership:** The Kentucky Board of Dentistry will advance legislation addressing the Oral Preventive Assistant role and corporate ownership issues.

Background Materials

I have prepared the attached report summarizing dental-relevant legislation enacted by the Kentucky General Assembly and signed by the Governor during the 2026 legislative session. Also, we will continue to discuss and propose possible legislation for the coming years.

2026 Kentucky HB 2, HB 500, and HB 776 all touch dentistry, but in very different ways: HB 2 restructures how Medicaid dental is administered, HB 500 is the two-year state budget that indirectly affects oral health infrastructure, and HB 776 is a direct overhaul of the Dental Practice Act and day-to-day practice rules.

Below is a concise, practice-oriented report focused on dentistry.

HB 2 (Acts Ch. 179): Medicaid and Dental Services

HB 2 is an omnibus Medicaid reform bill; its most important dental piece is a mandated shift of Medicaid dental from MCO-run networks to a standalone administrative services organization (ASO) model.

Key dental provisions:

- **ASO for Medicaid dental.**
HB 2 requires Medicaid-covered dental services to be administered by an ASO rather than bundled inside managed care, with the ASO handling administration but not taking on insurance risk. Compensation to the ASO is capped in the original version at no more than 2% of annual paid dental claims, though later substitutes adjust some of the implementation mechanics and timeline. A Dental Program Advisory Panel and a state Medicaid dental director position under KRS Chapter 313 are created to guide the program.
- **Timeline and transition (as modified by House Committee Substitute).**
The House Committee Substitute delays transition: it prohibits procurement of the dental ASO before January 1, 2028, and delays the actual switch to January 1, 2029, while still requiring DMS to employ a Medicaid dental director (licensed under KRS 313) by July 1, 2028. These changes are aimed at giving more time to design the network, quality metrics, and reimbursement methodology before abandoning the current MCO model.
- **Reporting and oversight.**
HB 2 requires DMS to submit an annual report on the Medicaid dental program to the Legislative Research Commission, covering utilization, cost, and program performance. It also directs LRC to build a healthcare transparency dashboard, which must track dental-program metrics among other Medicaid indicators.

Practical implications for a Kentucky dentist:

- Expect a major payer-side structural change around 2029, moving dental out of MCOs and into a single ASO with uniform rules, prior auth standards, and appeals processes.
- Advisory structures (dental director, advisory panel) give organized dentistry a clearer statutory channel to influence fees, covered services, and policy.
- In the near term (before 2028–2029) you remain under the existing MCO-based Medicaid dental arrangements, but should plan for contract and workflow changes as the ASO RFP process advances.

HB 500: State Budget and Indirect Dental Impacts

HB 500 is the main executive-branch budget bill (“AN ACT relating to appropriations measures”) for FY 2027–2028; it is not a dental bill, but it shapes the fiscal environment around oral health.

Headline features with dental relevance:

- **Overall spending posture.**
As filed, HB 500 reduces overall General Fund spending by about 2% in FY 2028 relative to FY 2026, while adding roughly \$75 million to the Department of Education but cutting many other cabinets and agencies, including higher education. Advocacy analyses describe significant cuts or freezes to many service areas, including transportation for K-12 and child care, which can affect broader social determinants of oral health (access to school-based programs, community clinics, etc.).
- **State employee and retiree health costs.**
The bill caps employer contributions to the Kentucky Employees Health Plan, with the Personnel Cabinet warning this could drive up to a 78% increase in employee premiums by 2028 for state

and local education workers.

While not dental-specific, higher health costs can crowd out funding for optional dental benefits and can reduce disposable income for public employees seeking elective dental care.

- **Education and workforce pipeline.**

HB 500 includes substantial cuts to postsecondary education (about \$187 million compared to FY 2026 levels), which may constrain funding capacity for public dental hygiene programs and allied-health training in state institutions.

It does not create major new, targeted state dental-workforce initiatives, so the main statutory support for dental scholarships/loan repayment is coming instead through HB 776's Board-controlled trust and agency funds (see below).

For a private dental/med-spa practice, HB 500 mostly operates in the background: it influences patient disposable income, local government capacity, and the educational pipeline, but does not directly change your licensure or billing rules.

HB 776: Kentucky Dental Practice Act Modernization

HB 776 is the core dentistry bill in 2026: it is "AN ACT relating to the practice of dentistry" and substantially revises KRS Chapter 313, effectively re-citing the chapter as the Kentucky Dental Practice Act.

Board of Dentistry, liability, and exams

- The bill requires the Kentucky Board of Dentistry to affiliate with all qualifying licensure examination organizations, not just a single testing body, to broaden exam options.
- It mandates that the Board purchase liability insurance for board members and staff for good-faith acts, which should make regulatory participation more sustainable.
- The Board is authorized to use trust and agency account funds for scholarships or education loan-repayment assistance to support individuals entering the dental field.

Hygienists: licensure classification and scope/supervision

- HB 776 changes hygienist licensure from "permissive" to **required** minimum classification licensure, tightening formal recognition of hygienists.
- It clarifies how a dental hygienist shall operate in a dental practice, including updated conditions for providing services, supervision standards, and allowable procedures.

Specific scope and supervision shifts (from statutory and secondary summaries):

- The law lifts a prior prohibition on hygienists making final impressions for dental restorations, allowing them to perform this function within defined practice parameters.
- Hygienists may now treat a patient without the supervising dentist physically present if the patient has been examined by that dentist within the last 11 months, extended from the previous 7-month requirement.

- Hygienists are expressly allowed to make radiographs on written order of a supervising dentist without the dentist being on-site, which formalizes more flexible radiography protocols.

Dental assistants, radiography, and telehealth

- HB 776 revises which services may be delegated to registered dental assistants and clarifies that assistants cannot perform hygiene services involving instrumentation to remove calculus and accretions from crowns and roots.
- It updates provisions around radiography, aligning assistant and hygienist radiograph-taking authority with current standards and supervision levels.
- Telehealth sections allow consent by a patient's legal representative during telehealth sessions and require informed consent and confidentiality protections consistent with federal law.

Ownership, “corporate dentistry,” and clinical control

- The original version would have created new controls over who may hold “controlling ownership” in dental practices and over clinical settings, but House Floor Amendment 1 deleted the most restrictive controlling-ownership language.
- The final bill still creates a new section of KRS 313 establishing that licensed dentists must retain control over clinical settings and key clinical responsibilities such as diagnosis, treatment planning, and patient records.
- It prohibits dental practice entities that establish reimbursement rates or are not licensed dentists from controlling clinical decision-making, effectively taking aim at corporate dentistry models that intruded into clinical judgment.

At the same time, HB 776 preserves existing lawful ownership and contract arrangements and allows entities already controlling a dental practice under contract to continue doing so, while barring new or expanded entities of this type going forward.

Dental laboratories and employment

- The bill adds “direct employment provisions” for dental laboratories working in Kentucky, specifying that labs operating or doing business in the state must comply with certain employment and control requirements by licensed dentists.
- This is meant to tighten oversight of lab-fabricated devices while recognizing the modern, multi-state structure of many labs.

Enforcement and wellness

- The Law Enforcement Committee of the Board of Dentistry is authorized to offer agreed orders during complaint investigations, which can streamline case resolution.
- The Well-being Committee may enter into contractual agreements, giving it clearer authority to manage dentist assistance and monitoring programs for impairment or mental-health issues.

Branding the chapter

- HB 776 creates a new section allowing KRS Chapter 313 to be formally cited as the **Kentucky Dental Practice Act**, underscoring that this is a comprehensive framework statute for the profession.

TAC REPORT. Dr BJ Millay presented the following report.

(most recent meeting 5.8.26)

I was unable to attend the meeting due to family emergency. Dr. Petrey was gracious to take the lead for the meeting.

Continue to discuss issues with Foster Children and AETNA SKY program. At this time, the contract has been established. No matter what issues exist, the state informed that contractually would take a long time to see any changes. So, any existing problems such as network and adequacy have to be met by the MCO. Once again to leaving MCO to dictate rules for remainder of contract. Aetna representatives noted that network adequacy remains under active monitoring, that recruitment efforts are ongoing, and that direct communication with DMS on this issue is continuing.

State does desire specific examples regarding network inadequacy across the board. Especially for foster children. So anyone knowing foster kids, case managers, foster parents having issues, please let us know so we can get those to the Managed Care Organization Branch. It will probably be easiest to send those directly to state at dmsweb@ky.gov or via the Kentucky Ombudsman at kyombud@ky.gov. At this time, I don't have a specific individual.

I do feel compelled to say that while we have been quite brutal to SKYGEN. A lot of these issues are not directly fault of SKYGEN. They overall have been open and willing to work with the TAC for the time being. Several issues are due to MCO jumping subcontractors.

The issue of jumping subcontractors is finally being recognized by DMS. However, the contracts to my knowledge has minimal stipulations for DMS oversight at this time.

Big wins with HB500 and HB2 create new discussion and tight time frame issues for the TAC. However, we are working diligently on this matter. We have received some data regarding information being requested. Hopefully this will help the TAC manage to develop a new fee schedule with input from other stake holders. At this time, the TAC is working to compose data. Special thanks to Dr. Petrey for his work in that area thus far.

TAC is also performing informal meetings with DMS. Hopefully this permits to head off issues, get questions answered, and provide continued feedback in developing relationships between TAC members and DMS. We are planning monthly meetings at this time.

The unofficial TAC minutes have just been released for member review. I can forward to anyone who would like to read the 70 plus pages once minutes approved. You can also watch the meeting online via youtube. Please be advised that TAC meetings are open to anyone that wishes to attend. However, please be aware that you are on public record and being recorded.

Please feel free to reach out with Medicaid issues at anytime.
